

St Cleopas CE Primary school - Collective worship annual planner

Collective Worship is invitational, inclusive and inspirational, enabling pupils and adults to encounter the Christian faith while respecting individual beliefs. Worship is rooted in the school's Christian vision and supports spiritual growth by enabling participants to reflect on meaning, purpose and values. Worship is planned around half-termly Christian values, supported by weekly themes, scripture and guidance. It is clearly linked to biblical teaching, enabling pupils to explore how Christian values shape character, relationships and daily life. Christian festivals, Holy Days and Saints' days are embedded across the year. Worship remains responsive and flexible, allowing the school community to reflect on local, national and global events.

Each act of worship follows a clear structure and includes opportunities to:

- Gather and welcome the community
- Engage through story, scripture or discussion
- Respond through song, prayer and reflection
 - Reflect quietly and personally
 - Be sent out to live out the value

Autumn 1	Friendship	Jesus modelled faithful friendship, calling his disciples friends and teaching love, trust and service (John 15:12-15).	Pupils build inclusive, supportive relationships and value community.	<i>How can we be good friends to others?</i>
Autumn 2	Respect	Christians believe all people are made in the image of God (Genesis 1:27), giving every individual dignity and worth.	Pupils show respect for difference, diversity and belief.	<i>How do we show respect in our words and actions?</i>
Spring 1	Joy	Christian joy is rooted in God's love and faithfulness, not just circumstances (Philippians 4:4).	Pupils learn gratitude, resilience and hope.	<i>How can we share joy with others?</i>
Spring 2	Compassion	Jesus demonstrated compassion through healing, forgiveness and care for the marginalised (Matthew 9:36).	Pupils respond with kindness, empathy and action.	<i>How can we show compassion to those in need?</i>
Summer 1	Forgiveness	Forgiveness is central to Christian belief and reconciliation, modelled through Jesus' sacrifice (Luke 23:34).	Pupils learn reconciliation, peace-making and emotional maturity.	<i>Why is forgiveness important for relationships?</i>
Summer 2	Courage	God calls his people to act justly and trust Him (Joshua 1:9). Jesus showed courage in standing for truth and love.	Pupils are encouraged to stand up for what is right and make positive choices.	<i>When do we need courage in our lives?</i>
